FRUITSANDVEGETABLES



FRUITS

Of the many fruits produced in Pakistan, oranges and mangoes are rated highly in terms of export demand. There are several kinds of oranges produced in large quantities every year, such as Kinno, Mosambi and Malta. Fresh orange juices are a favourite summer drink in the country. Citrus fruits like oranges also provides the basis for flourishing preserves and processing industry, which produces jams, marmalades, squashes and juices 2014-15 Export value of Citrus fruits from Pakistan, was US\$ 172 million to more than 40 countries all over the world.

Mangoes are another favorite in the fruits markets of the world its Export value in 2014-15 was 46 million

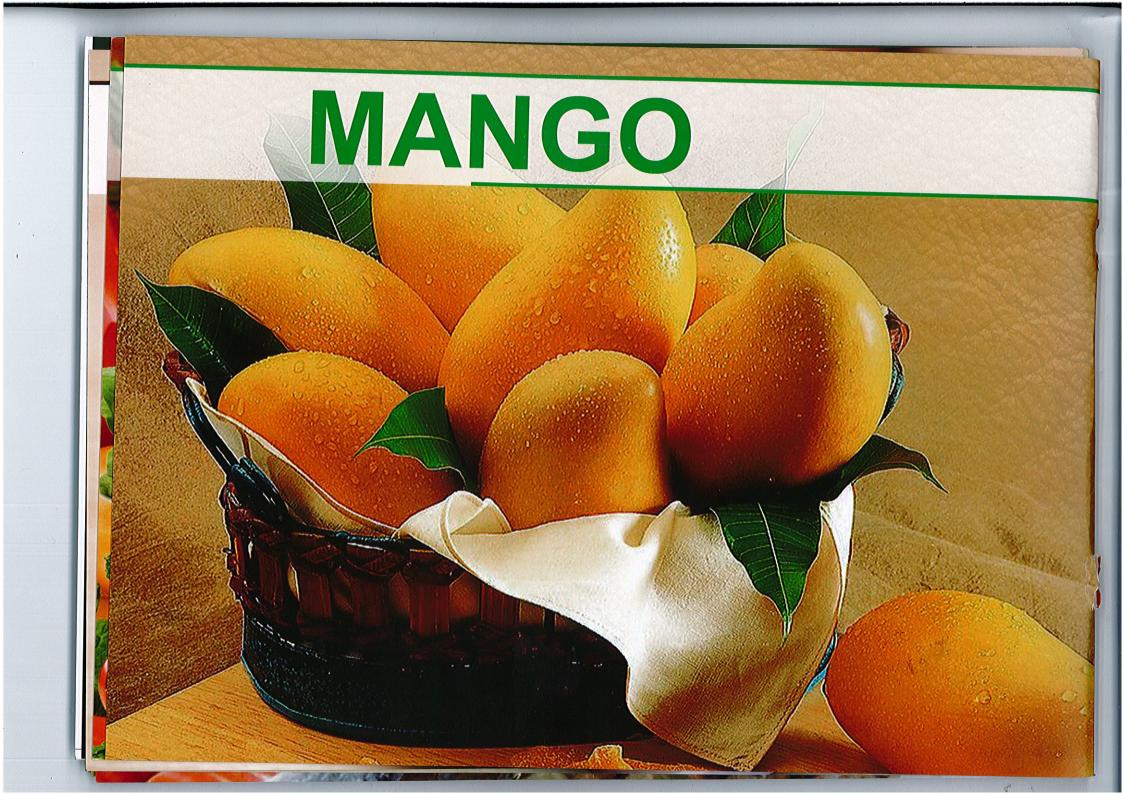
Mangoes are unique as their by-products includes jams, juices and squashes and pickles.

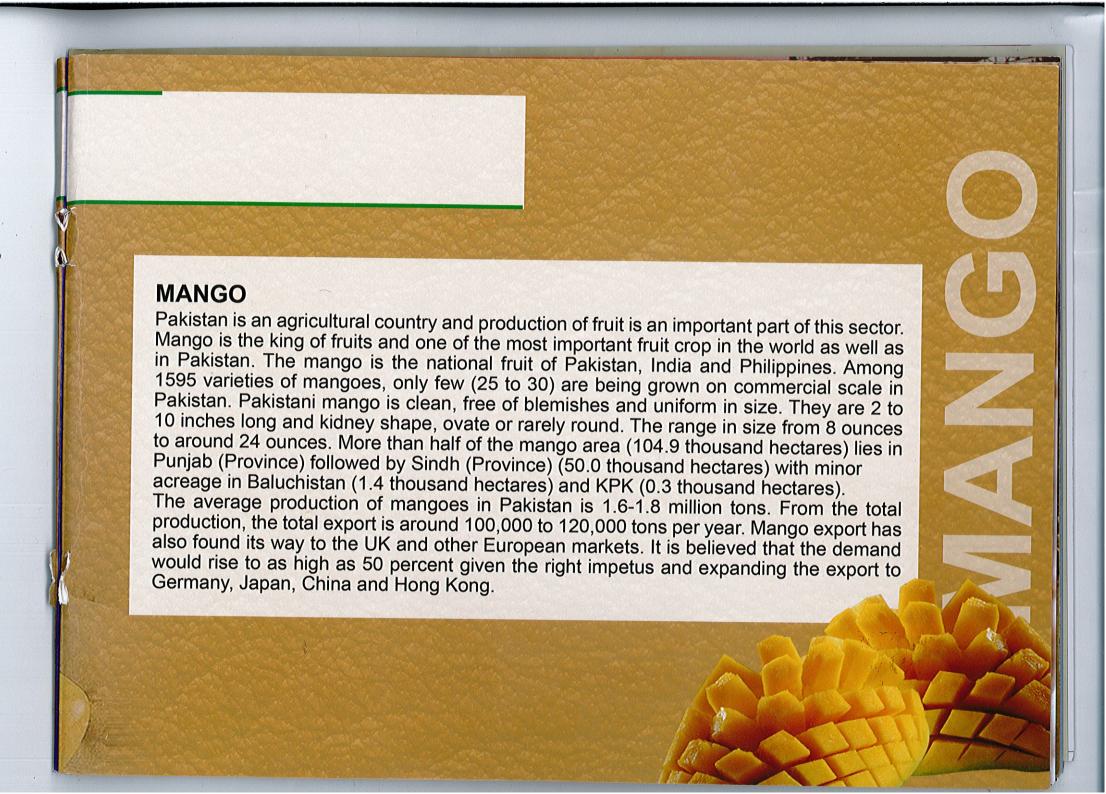
In addition to oranges and mangoes, there are several other fruits which are exported in large quantities every year. These include apples, guavas, papapyas, pears, peaches, plums apricots, berries, grapes, figs, melons, pomegranates and cherries. Some of these such as apples, have widespread demand in the fruit markets of the world, whereas others cater to specialized demand total export of value of these fruits in 2014-15 was over US\$ 160 million.

VEGETABLES

Pakistan covers a wide canvas of varieties like leguminous, alliaceous, fibrous, roots and tubers which are grown in the country, catering to the demands of food cultures all over the world and also in Pakistan.

The vegetables grown in Pakistan, which are most frequently used in kitchens across the world include; potatoes, tomatoes, onions, peas, beans, cauliflower, cabbage gourd, pumpkin, turnip brinjal (also known as eggplant), spinach, okra (also known as lady fingers) and mushrooms. In addition to theses varieties, some are used in cooking, mainly as seasoning, which include: lemon, green chillies, ginger and garlic vegetables exports grew by 11% and reach to US \$ 232 million 14% of this export was of Potato.







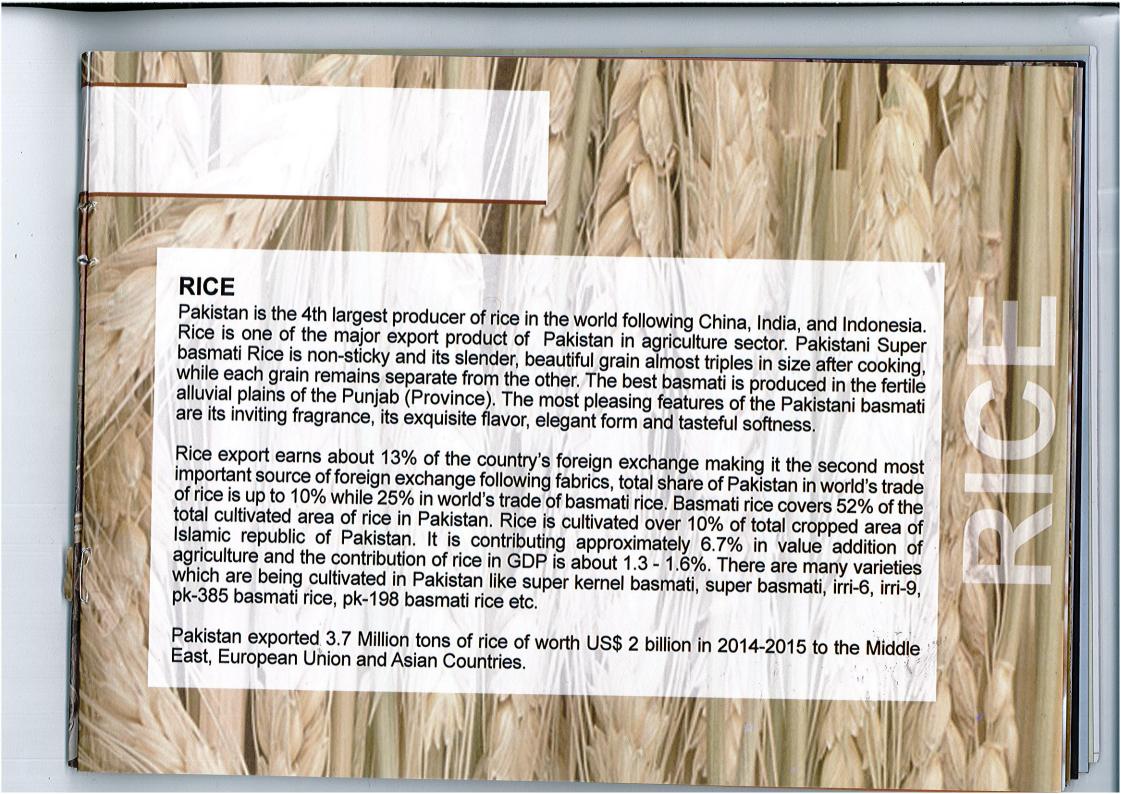
KINNOW

Kinnow, the result of a long period of cross-fertilization and hybridization is a cross between an Orange and a Mandarin. The growing process is completely natural which enhances the fruit's original flavour.

The fruit itself is rich in taste and value - it is estimated that one kinnow carries enough Vitamin C to fulfill an individua's daily intake demand. It is also a convenient fruit to eat, anytime and anywhere. A kinnow peels off easily and consists of 9 or 10 easy to separate segments inside. Its flavour is rich in high sugar, moderate to low acid and a unique and pleasant aroma. The peel, full of aromatic oil glands, can be used to make essences, and elements extracted from this peel are used to make cosmetics. The pulp is ideal for jams, sauces and a variety of desserts. In addition to this, kinnow's long shelf life makes it the perfect winter fruit.

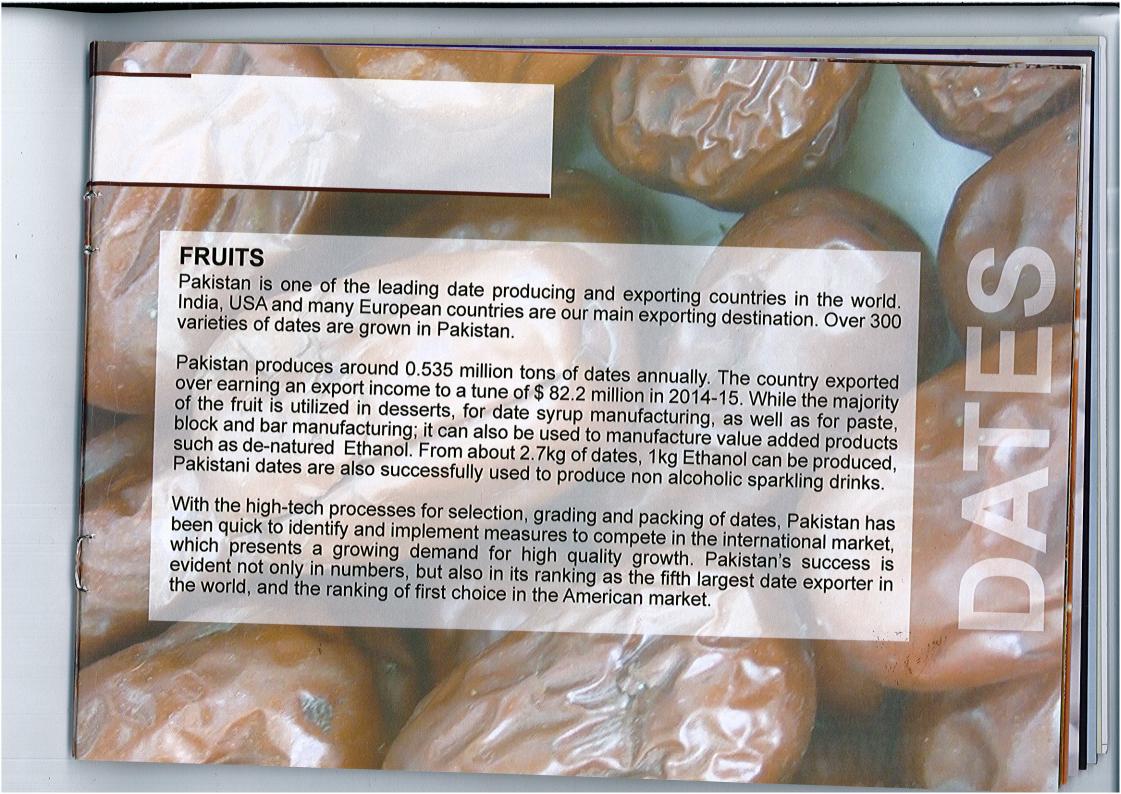

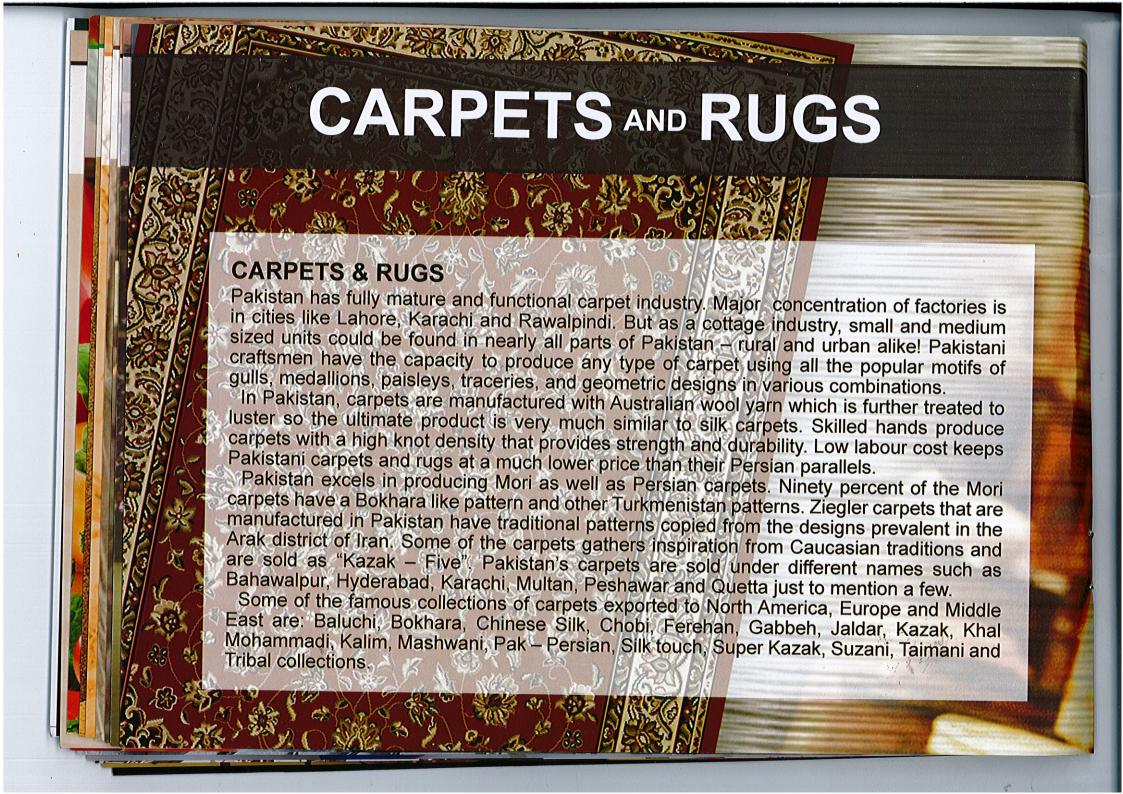

Pakistan is producing Ball, Footballs / soccer Balls / inflatable balls, Balls for Cricket, Tennis, Leather Balls for Cricket, Hand Balls, Volley Balls, Basket Balls, Other balls (Hockey, Squash, Table Tennis, Polo, Rugby, Golf etc); sticks Hockey, Ice Hockey, Bats, Cricket (Hard, Tape Ball & Soft Ball), Fishing Hooks and accessories, Sports Gloves, Gymnastic / athletic items, Protective Wears equipments and accessories for different games (Wickets, nets, shuttle cocks etc.

Pakistan exports sport goods to Germany, USA, Belgium, UK & Brazil. Pakistan ranks 17th in export of sport goods to world with 1% share. American, Asian and European regions are all the major destination of made in Pakistan sports goods. Pakistan has world class manufacturing facilities and state of the art in infrastructures for producing world class sports goods.





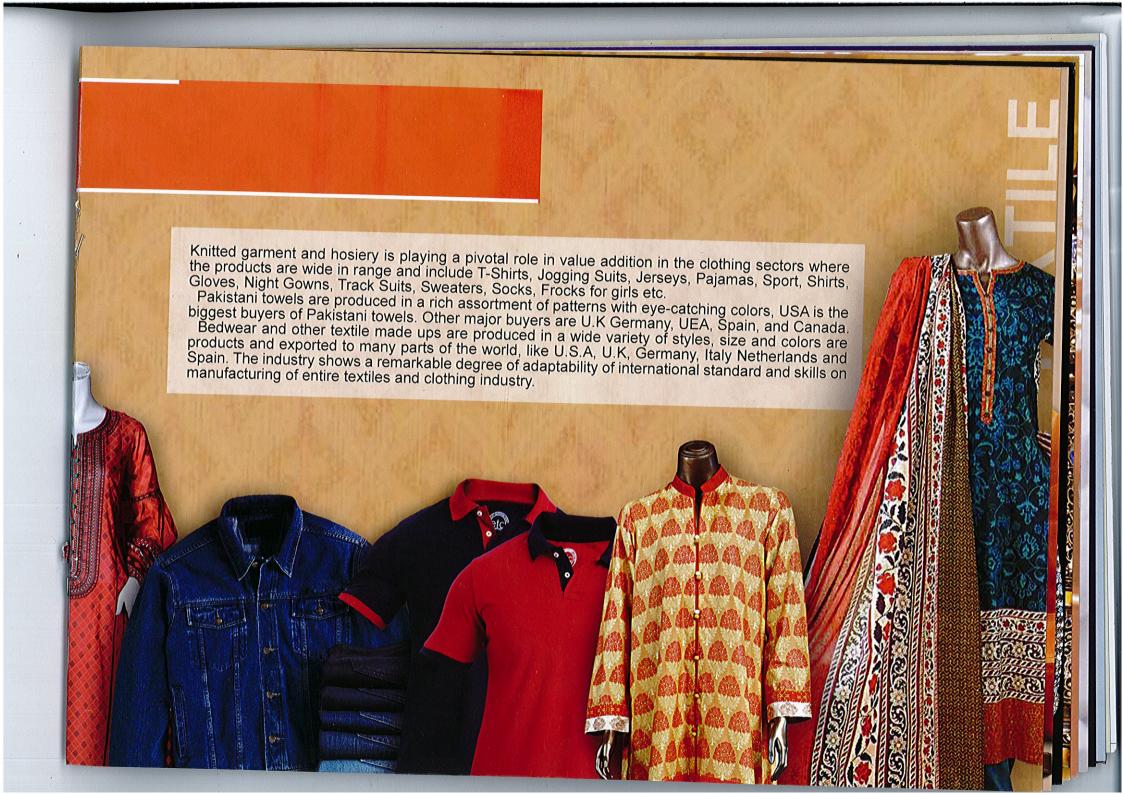


TEXTILE & CLOTHING

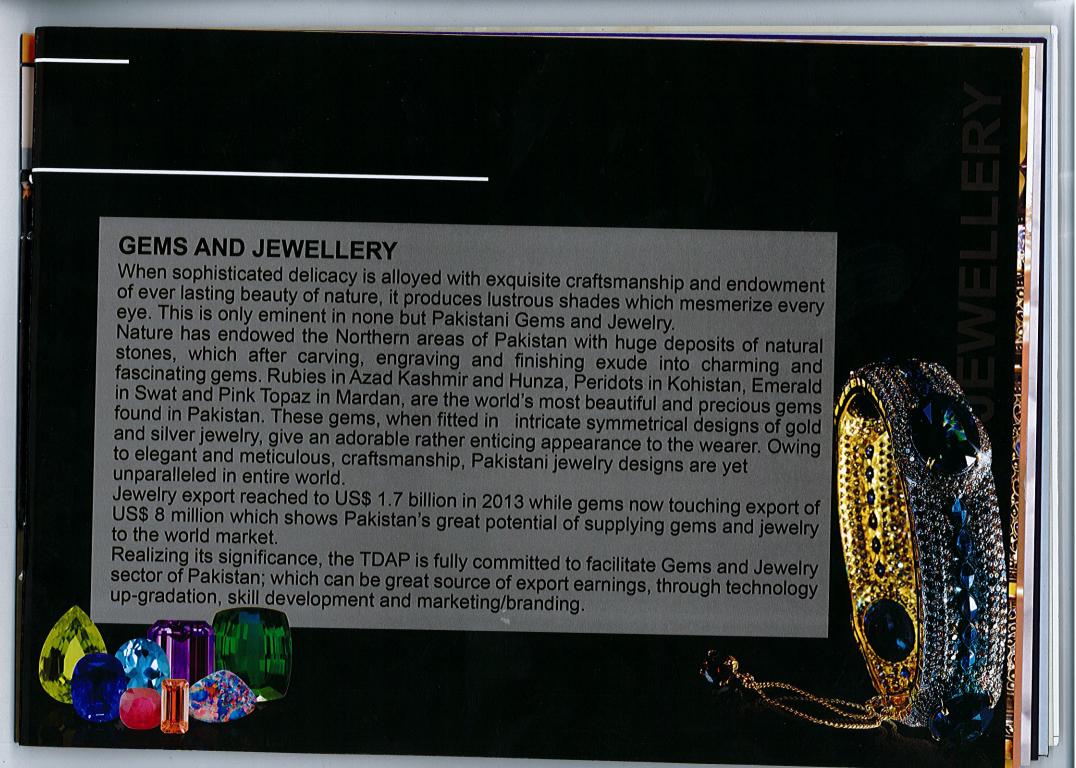

HANDICRAFT

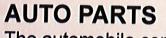

AUTO PARTS





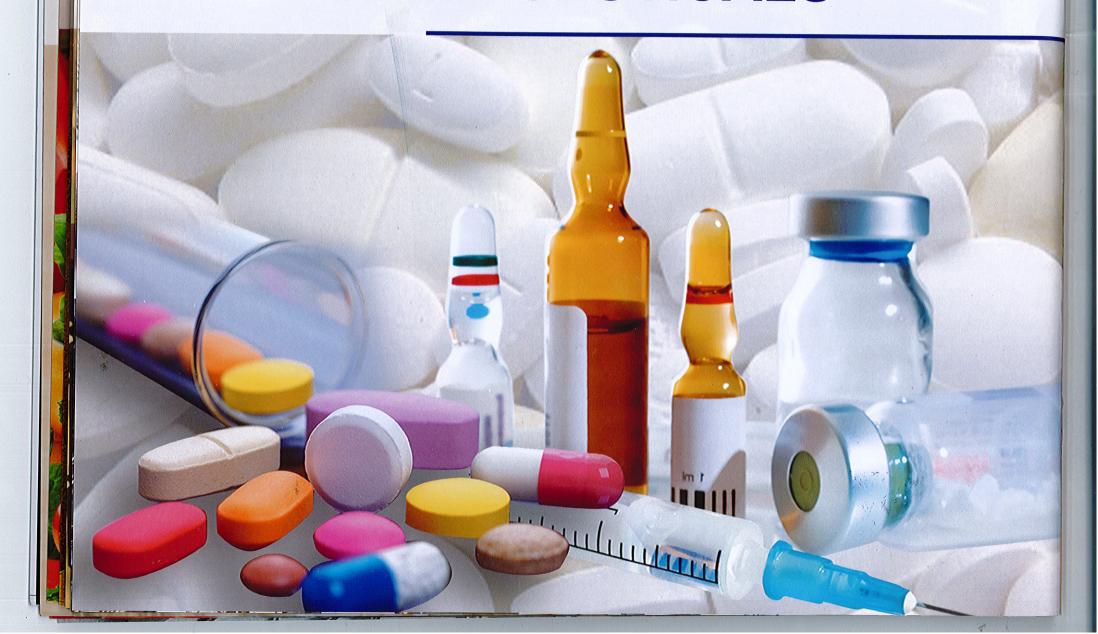
The automobile component industry in Pakistan is in the process of meeting the challenges of the emerging competition in the local and international auto industry. The auto parts vending industry comprises of some 750 various sized industries; large, medium and small. It provides jobs to half a million people.

An improvement in market access for automotive parts manufactured in Pakistan has taken place in the industrial countries markets – not only as replacement parts but also as original components in many of the vehicles produced. This has happened as a result of WTO agreements bringing down tariffs worldwide.

Pakistan has also opened its market, among others, in respect of auto parts since 1998, the import regime of Pakistan has been significantly liberalized through reduction in tariffs, rationalization and removal of import quotas, import surcharges and regulatory duties.

Pakistan has enough potential to export auto parts. At the moment export is around US\$ 31 million mainly to Afghanistan, Middle East, Bangladesh, Sri Lanka and African Region.

PHARMACEUTICALS



PHARMACEUTICALS

Pharmaceuticals while the inroads into the pharmaceutical industry in Pakistan came from herbal medicine, the industry has developed continuously over the years. In allopathic medicines, Pakistan's presence and acceptance in global markets is encouraging. A sizeable part of the local industry is already engaged in export activity. Pakistan's pharmaceuticals are being exported to more than 30 countries, including Sri Lanka, Singapore, UAE, Bangladesh, Thailand, Sudan, the CIS nations, etc.

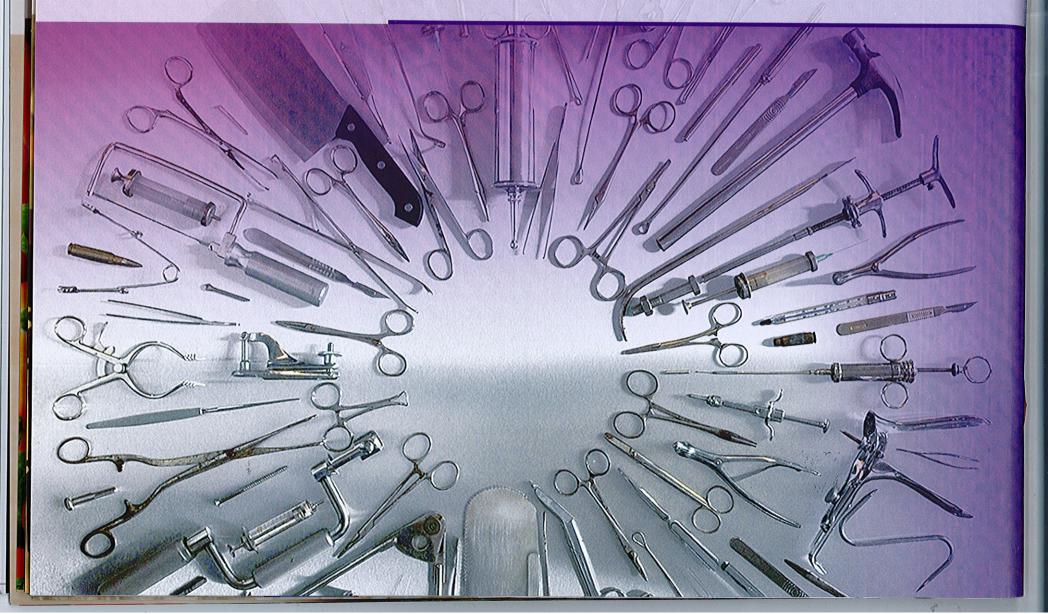
In line with the expected standards of quality, the medicines produced are in accordance with WHO standards as well good manufacturing practices. The exports have been rising

steadily over the years.

There are about 25 multi-national companies and over 500 local manufacturers. Almost all of these manufacturers are producing drugs in dosage form.

Globally the pharma industry is growing rapidly at the rate of more than 4% to 7% annually and producing indigenous products varying from common cold pills to high potency sophisticated products. Pakistan has very good potential of exporting pharmaceutical products. Our export is continuously growing and reached to US\$ 212 million showing 215 growth in 2014-15.

SURGICAL



SURGICAL

Pakistan has a history spanning over a century of skilled craftsmanship in manufacturing surgical instruments. This industry growth has over the last few decades combined with modern equipment and manufacturing technology to produce surgical instruments of the highest quality which are exported to over 140 countries around the world. Over 1,000 manufacturing units in the country possess the capability to produce up to 10,000 different types / categories of instruments, with annual production capacity of 160 million pieces.

Pakistan produces a wide range of medical, surgical, veterinary and hospital instruments and equipment's in cottage industries as well as in modern factories. Products can be made in accordance with British, German, American or any international standard / specifications, as the industry has the experience and capacity to produce instruments of varied specifications, according to buyer's needs. The advanced countries of Europe and America are the leading buyers of Pakistan's surgical instruments.

Surgical instruments manufacturers have been following strict international manufacturing standards conforming to WHO standards. Over 300 companies have ISO-9002 certification and about 250 have certification of Good Manufacturing Practices.

Export of surgical instruments is persistently growing and reached to over US\$ 341 million in 2014-15.

SEA FOOD



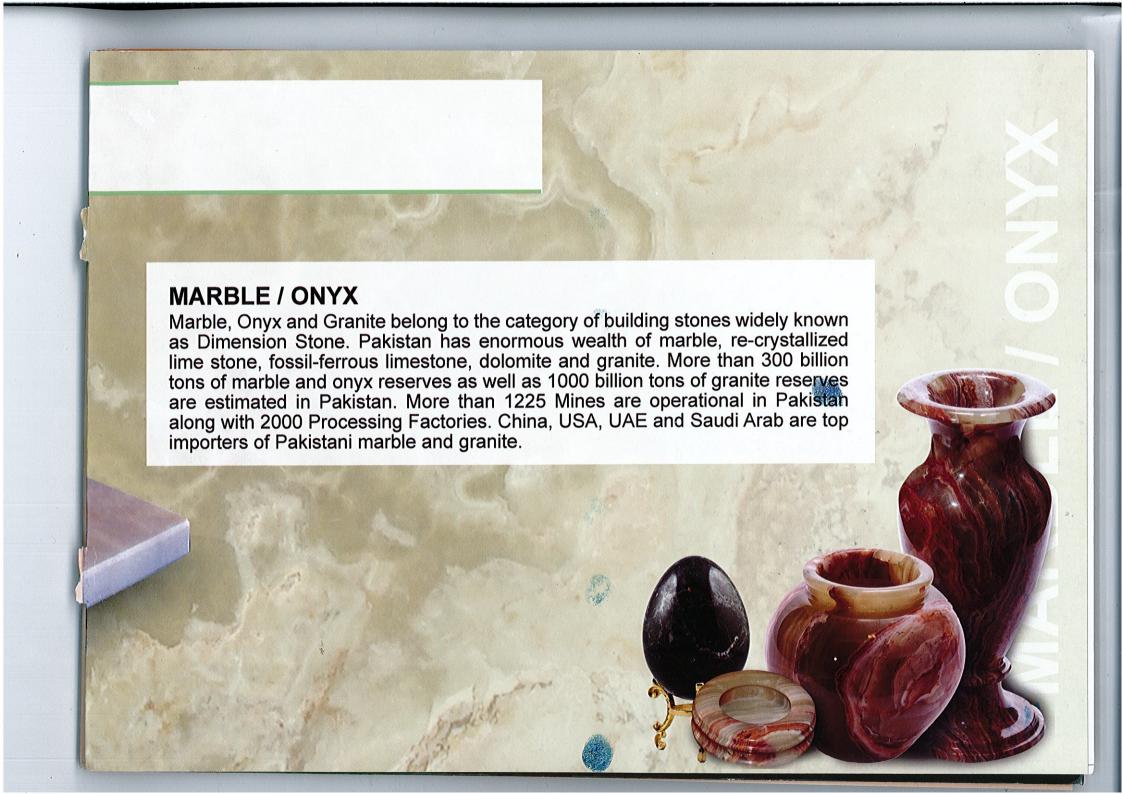
SEA FOOD

Seafood is now in great demand nationally and internationally. Fishery is playing an important role in the national economy. The fish production which was estimated to about 32,000 metric tons in 1947 increased to a level of about 765,000 metric tons in 2014-2015. It is providing employed in ancillary fishermen directly about 400,000 and 500,000 people employed in ancillary industries. Fishery is also a major source of export earnings. In 2014-15 fish and fishery products valued at US\$349.23 million were exported from Pakistan.

Government is responsible for management for fishery and territorial and Exclusive Economic Zone of Pakistan in addition, it is also responsible for making policies. Interactional co-ordination, planning, research, quality control, training, exploratory fishing, stock assessment, fleet improvement, data collection and export etc.
